We do hope that you and those dear to you are staying safe and healthy during this unprecedented health crisis. Please know that The Arc Westchester has taken every possible measure to ensure the safety and well-being of our individuals, families, and of course, our incredible employees, as we fight our local battle against the COVID-19 pandemic. The Arc Westchester family is, and always will be, **our top priority**.

Even before the coronavirus reached New York, The Arc Westchester had formed an Emergency Management Team (EMT) to spearhead its response to the crisis. The EMT has been working 24/7 to care for the health and well-being of those we support and the staff who is so deeply invested in them, as well as to keep the lines of communication open with all members of our community.

Because of the past support from our generous donors, we were prepared to respond right away when the crisis began. For that, we are deeply grateful.

However, ensuring a continuum of safe and healthy services for the children, teens, adults and seniors in our programs, has proven to be very taxing on everyone, especially our Direct Support Professionals (DSPs), who are on the frontlines of this pandemic.

In the **first 5 weeks** of this crisis, expenses for Personal Protective Equipment (PPE), sanitizing supplies, and other household items that are vital to the protection of the 245 individuals sheltering in place in our 44 residences and their dedicated DSPs, have exceeded **\$100,000**.

Our residential and day services employees are going above and beyond to ensure the safety and health of our individuals. In many cases, residential staff is working double shifts to ensure continuity of service, filling in for other employees who are ill or at high risk, and are unable to work. This, and the need to pay DSPs premium salaries to retain them in their vital roles, is going to heavily impact our 2020 payroll budgets.

Here are a few more examples of human resilience and staying the course on our commitment to providing innovative services and supports to people of all ages with developmental disabilities and their families, even during these most challenging times.

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- Nurses and other professional staff in the Wellness Center clinic are using Zoom and FaceTime to provide seamless support to individuals with medication, psychotherapy, nutritional, occupational and speech services. Our nutritionist has also launched Quick, Easy and Delicious (QED) Cooking Lessons on YouTube.
- The Children's School for Early Development is holding parent conferences virtually and using Google Classroom to help parents support their children's progress at home.
- Day Services staff, alongside some wonderful volunteers, has been shifting programming to an online format to keep people engaged with their friends and support staff, combatting regression and depression that can result from isolation.
- Individuals in our residences who are unable to volunteer in the community have taken on projects to support their neighbors from the safety of their homes. The staff and individuals in our Scott Place residence have created over 100 masks and plan to donate to Caritas of Port Chester, a Food and Soup Kitchen.
